# Pastor's Reflection



Though I'm writing this article in mid March, it will be Holy Week by the time you read it—the week that carries us from death into life. The week that writes a new story in our lives and in the life of the entire universe.

We are coming out of a time of profound loss in our history—loss of human life. One in three people in the United States have lost a loved one to Covid-19. Loss of jobs and income that has effected millions of Americans, with minorities being the hardest hit. Loss of community in the ways we were used to gathering, which has led to profound isolation for many people. Loss of normal milestone experiences for our young people – school as we once knew it, sports, prom, graduation, going off to college, graduating from college and launching into a new career. It's hard to say the long-term impact all of this will have on this generation of young people.

But what I want to think about in this article is how we honor all of the loss, and how we make meaning of it. Last year, when the pandemic first started, I had a high school senior (and I do this year too). When I talked about the profound loss for him of all of the experiences of his senior year, someone pointed out to me that in 1969 and 1970, young men graduated to go off to the Vietnam War.

The underlying message was, “This is not that big of a deal compared to that.” While that may be true, it is never helpful to compare our suffering with someone else's. While it definitely would've been much worse if my high school senior had been going off to war, that does not invalidate the deep sense of loss he felt at losing his senior year.

In the same way, when someone has lost a loved one, try not to compare that loss to any other losses you've experienced. And allow the grieving person to grieve as long as, and in whatever way, he/she wants to grieve. We never “get over” the loss of a loved one, and we don't “move on.” But over time, we learn how to live with and make meaning out of that loss. This happens when we have people around us who allow us to grieve, and who don't try to put a rainbow at the end of our path, or tie a nice bow on it so that we can “feel better soon.” The best thing you can do for someone who is suffering a loss is to simply “be with” that person. Let them know you care and that you love them. And just listen. When author Parker Palmer was going through a long bout of deep depression, he said that the person who had the biggest impact on his healing was a man who visited him once/week and said hardly a word. He just sat and massaged Parker's feet.

So during this time of loss, try not to compare losses, and try to just be with each other in a loving and compassionate way.

And the second thing I want to think about is how we go about making meaning of the losses we have endured. Because as we go through life, we all have experiences, but it is not the experiences themselves that have an impact on us so much as how we interpret those experiences--the story we are telling ourselves about what is happening to us and to the people we love. Victor Frankl, a holocaust survivor, wrote in his book "Man's Search for Meaning,"

"Everything can be taken from a man but one thing: the last of the human freedoms—to choose one's attitude in any given set of circumstances, to choose one's own way."

Our young people may be saying, "I lost my whole senior year. I didn't get to play my sport. I lost my prom. I lost a graduation ceremony that everyone else has gotten." And while this is true, and we want to listen compassionately and honor the deep and very valid sense of loss they have, how might we also help our young people begin to tell a different story? Because although they've lost so much, we can also say, "I see the incredible strength and perseverance you've brought to this whole situation. I see someone who is rising up with ingenuity and creativity, and making the best out of a really tough situation. I see someone who has really stepped up to care for others who are hurting, and whose character is being revealed and deepened in some incredible ways. Your generation will

have a resilience that others will not. And you'll be able to say to your grandchildren, 'I lived through the worldwide pandemic of 2020 and 2021.' You and your classmates will be able to bond over this memory forever, no other class has had to go through what you have, and yet it has made you stronger and better in so many ways."

This story does not discount the sadness they feel and the very real loss that they've endured, but it does help them move from victimhood to having some sense of agency in what is happening to them and how they interpret it. And this in turn, will shape how they come out of it and what kind of people they become because of it.

If there is any time in the church year that honors loss, death, grief, and also new life and a new story, it is Holy Week. The Lord taught us how to walk this journey, and walks it with us still.

May you know the deep love of God for you.

May you know the compassion and grace of Christ in your life.

May you share that love, compassion and grace with others along the way.

And may we together tell a new story.
